Mental health advocate and storyteller spins personal trauma and tragedy into comedic gold.

WASHINGTON—Leah Harris spent her childhood hunting imaginary Nazis with her schizophrenic mother, obsessing about ancient aliens, dieting with and rebelling against her hypercritical grandmother, attempting suicide, and collecting psychiatric diagnoses. Discovering John Waters' films in a teen psychiatric ward helped her learn to embrace her "inner weirdo" and pursue a life worth living. With humor and heart, her stories explore the complexities of trauma, mental health, loss, struggle, and survival among three generations of women in her troubled Jewish family.

Says Harris, "this show is the culmination of my fifteen years as a mental health advocate and storyteller. It has allowed me the creative freedom to dance on that fine line between comedy and tragedy, raising awareness about the effects of psychological trauma and the capacity to heal."
